
# FACTS AND FIGURES








# SCHOLARSHIPS: AT THE HEART OF STUDENT SUCCESS



# Financials

# Investment Return FY19

Many factors influence the value of the NAU Foundation Endowment and individually endowed funds, including gifts to each fund, overall endowment distribution, and investment earnings.

The NAU Foundation Endowment Market Value as of June 30, 2019, was \$164,139,651. Endowment returns for fiscal year 2019 were 3.3 percent.

The endowment's growth is a long-term investment. This valuation is at a point in time, while stock market performance changes on a daily basis. Over 10 years the endowment yielded an average of 10.10 percent. The chart on the following page compares the NAU Foundation to our peer group based on endowment size as reported in the 2019 National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO)-TIAAA Study of Endowments. The NAU Foundation has outperformed our peers on the three-, five- and ten-year horizons.

# NAU FOUNDATION ENDOWMENT PERFORMANCE

For fiscal year 2018-2019, the Payout was computed based on 4 percent applied to the three-year rolling average of the endowment pool market value as of December 31. One and a half percent (1.5%) of the December 31, 2018, market value of the endowment is designated as a reinvestment fee to support NAU Foundation operations.

The endowment is invested in perpetuity to generate a predictable and steady support for scholarships and programs at NAU. The Foundation maintains a well-diversified investment portfolio with a long track record of strong growth and performance.
